Our team of full-time employees and hiring managers have been eagerly awaiting your arrival. With some intense training in Philmont values and operations, you bring

the skill sets and positive, can-do attitudes needed to fulfill our mission, "To Deliver Wilderness and Learning Adventures That Last a Lifetime". In simplest terms, we change lives in many positive ways, and you are a critically important part of that team.

I'd like to break down some important team statistics for you. First, we have 617 (51%) returning staff and 604 (49%) new staff. Exactly 700 (57%) have earned their Eagle Scout award, including 685 men and 15 women. Another seven women have earned the Gold Award in Girl Scouts. We have assembled a team, regardless of Scouting background, that lives the values of the Scout Oath and Law by example!

Finally, I would be remiss if I didn't remind you of the most important aspect of doing

your job well. You must take care of yourself in body, mind and soul. Have you ever run out of gas and been stuck on the side of the road? It's important to recognize when your car is almost out of fuel and stop by the gas station to refill the tank. All athletes recognize the importance of keeping their bodies fueled with food and water, or else they won't have the strength to finish the game. We tell our crews hiking in the backcountry how important it is to get a good night's sleep, to eat and hydrate properly and to take note of their spiritual needs. It is important advice for each of us as well.

Set personal goals, enjoy time off away from your responsibilities at Philmont, and get the rest and proper nutrition you need. You cannot be the leader you were made to be without taking care of yourself. I look forward to seeing each of you in base camp or on the trail soon. Welcome to the team! I couldn't be more excited that you are here to exemplify outstanding leadership and character.

As we start each summer, I am reminded of the powerful words of Teddy Roosevelt from his 1910 speech in Paris, titled "The Man in the Arena."

"It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat."

You are here and Philmont is the arena. We are the doer of deeds; all kinds of deeds within our areas of responsibility and perhaps some outside. We often quip these other deeds as 'other duties as assigned.' But we do them, all of them, with passion. Philmont literally lays out a trail to the summit, but there are often obstacles.

We may stumble, and we may not always reach the summit, even when we strive valiantly, but that is a necessary part of the journey. Without failing, the summit is never as triumphant. This speech shares an incredible lesson on the value of the attempt. There is no payoff without effort, and you control that effort. The success is in the process of doing, not the outcome.

Philmont is an adventure unlike anywhere else. Our jobs here are adventures every day, and we have the incredible opportunity of passing that adventure on to all we meet. The rules of Tents are simple:


- Pair each tree with a tent adjacent horizontally or vertically. This should be a 1 to 1 relation.





Welcome HOmE from the 700 Units!

Since October 2022, thousands of Scouts from around the country have looked forward to visiting

Philmont this summer. As they prepare their gear, go on shakedown hikes, and build their crews, they have also built up excitement for the one thing that makes this land such a special place for millions - you, the Philmont Staff.

As the crews prepare for their treks, the Backcountry and Ranger Departments prepare to deliver the promise of world-class programing. We have updated the Ranger Fieldbook and Crew Training Checklist for this summer, including teaching methods of backpacking in the Philmont wilderness. In addition, we have further developed the ranger scheduling capabilities in the Gateway from last year. Now Rangers will be able to schedule days off, request crews or itineraries, and be able to view their schedule, all from their own Gateway profile online.

In the backcountry, we have prepared new staff camps in new areas of land that we have not hiked on in years, such as Deer Lake, Harlan, Turkey Creek Canyon, and the northern parts of the Valle Vidal, like Ring Place. Crews will



also be able to climb Little Costilla in July and August. These new camps give crews the opportunity to take part in programs that have not been offered in a couple years, such as mountain-biking. Next, we are also excited to roll out new backcountry camp profiles, developed by Dr. Bob Wettemann, History Professor at the U.S. Air Force Academy. These new camp profiles will help guide the staff at living history camps to share a cohesive historical narrative, in order to better tell the story of this land to all the participants that come to Philmont this summer.

It is an exciting time to see all the Philmont Staff check in for the summer, ready to deliver a stellar program. From our conversations with many of those participants during Philmont Advisor Skill School (PASS), Preparedness Seminars, and over many phone calls and emails, we know that they are most excited to meet you!





to work on a project or make a gift for your friends and family back home. The Training Center is all about fun; feel free to stop by and join in the activities.




